

# From the President's Gavel



# From the WCRA History Files

Remembering the Bicentennial—

Twentyfive years ago, the United States was preparing to celebrate the 200th anniversary of our nation's independence during 1976. Most of planning took place in 1975. Just about everyone and every organization wanted to be involved someway. In response to many requests, the FCC authorized the voluntary use of special call signs by amateur radio operators during the 1976 bicentennial year. Prior approval was not required from the commission. The call sign plan was completely voluntary and required only the temporary exchange of existing prefixes by amateur stations within the contiguous United States with specific prefixes, in accordance with the following chart. Stations located outside the contiguous United States also could change but added a change in digit too, as shown on the following chart. All suffixes remained unchanged. Amateurs could interchange their calls with their own during 1976. Remember these special prefixes were valid only during 1976. Existing call-sign prefixes and equivalent bicentennial call-sign prefixes are shown below:

For example, WA9USA would become AA9USA and W9CCU would become AC9CCU (although W9CCU could still be used). So if you see some of these prefixes from the past that seem to be strange, this is how the came to be used. Amateur call signs were assigned in such a way that certain characters (1-0) indicated the geographical area that the station was operating in. For the FCC to maintain some flexibility in assignment of call signs, additional prefix blocks needed to be assigned. Call signs with prefixes N and AAthrough ALwere introduced late in 1975. These new prefix call signs were not included in the bicentennial program. Also prior to mid 1976 only the U.S.Navy used the N prefix.

Of course there were contests and awards that were special to the 1976 Bicentennial time period.

Awards—CQ magazine had an USA-NPX-76 award for working 200 US stations using the bicentennial Prefixes.

- ---The ARRL had a special bicentennial WAS award.
- ---The WCRAhad an award for contacts during 1976 with at least 25 WCRA members. Barry
  - Nelson, K9YVT, was the first amateur to win this award.
- ---Terry Batt, WB9GLO, offered three bicentennial awards;
  - (1) a bicentennial WAS award; (2) a
  - Prefix award for forty different prefix contacts;
  - (3) a district award for working all ten districts.
- ---There were many many more, this is but a sample. The 1976 Bicentennial was a big event. How many of our club members were successful in winning any of these awards?

This was a unique time in our country's history as well as our club and amateur radio in general. The past twentyfive years have brought many changes to our country and the hobby of amateur radio. Many of our members remember the interesting Field Day in 1976 with these temporary prefixes. The WCRA Field Day results show the club came in 75th out of 176 clubs.

WCRA Minutes from the November 9, 2000 Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by the President, Joe, N9WRO, and introductions were made by the board and all attendees. A motion was made and accepted to approve the minutes of the October meeting. Vice-President, Janie, AE9JG, mentioned that the room at Wheaton College will not be available for the first Friday in May. Kim (our treasurer in training?) stood in for Treasurer, John W9LQL, and gave a report of the club's financial condition. Custodian, Kurt, KB9RTO, reported that the club truck was at JOTA and hosted 61 visitors. Membership, Carol, KB9FYL, one new member was voted in at this meeting, Philip, W9TUD. Hamfest, John, N9MWF, reported that much has transpired since the last meeting. The Chicago Motor Speedway is having mandated construction, and will be unable to host the Hamfest. This was the prize for coming in fourth (out of 25) for the presentation on Amateur Radio during the showing of the movie, Frequency. repairs. Don also reported that the 220 machine sees regular usage. # Activities on the HF Bands

Rumors were flying in October about a possible P5 operation from North Korea. According to "The Daily DX" a multi-national team of operators met in Seoul, South Korea "in preparation for the trip. However, only hours before they were to board the bus that would take them into North Korea for the operation, authorities informed them that permission to operate Amateur Radio would not be granted. The group was, however, given a new date of January 7, 2001, for a possible operation. Only a few details are available because of the sensitive nature of this venture. More details are to follow, and I will hopefully be able to include them in my January column. Let's hope that this operation can take place. In the mean time, KYFC and stay tuned.

Conway Reef should be a very busy DX location in the coming months, with two separate DXpeditions planned from there. Hrane, YT1AD, reports that he has organized an operation to Conway from February 5-15th, 2001. They will have three stations active at the same time, each with a 1KW amp. Additionally, each station will have two 3-element multi-band beam antennas, one vertical and wires for Top Band. The license was issued on October 5th, 2000, but the callsign has not been released, to prevent pirate operation. The call will be publicized in the beginning of February.

Furthermore, a group of European operators headed by Mats,5X1Z/SM7PKK and Nils,SM6CAS have also announced a major DXpedition to Conway Reef two months later in April. Operators will also include:Janne,SMØDJZ, Pekka, OH1RY, Siggi,TF3CW and Steve,G4EDG will be active between April 5th through the 24th. Three of these operators have already been on Conway Reef once or twice, and the majority of team are well seasoned DXpeditioners. This undertaking will feature 4 complete stations running 24 hours a day as follows: The first position will run SSB on 20,15,10, the second on CW for the same bands. The third station will work 40, 80,160, SSB/CW/RTTY and 6-meters, while the remaining operating position will work SSB/CW on the WARC bands (30,17 & 12 meters). All stations will have their own generators, amplifiers and Force 12 antennas.

Since Conway is higher on the Most Wanted list in Europe, that will be the main target area. However the team promises ample opportunity to the rest of the world who may need this as a new one, or those who are chasing band/mode countries. They plan a much longer stay than any previous operation, covering 3 full weekends and a total of 19 days on the Reef (this will include the whole Easter week). No callsign for the operation was mentioned in the press release. The estimated cost of the DXpedition is approximately \$45,000.

On December 9-10, the Radio Agency of the Netherlands will celebrate the 50th anniversary of former intercontinental radio reception station "NERA" with a special event station operated by employees of the Radio Agency. The callsign PC-50-N has been applied for. The callblock 'PC'has not been issued to radio amateurs before. "NERA" was converted to a professional monitoring station for longwave through UHF for the Dutch Radio Agency. The name stands for "NEderhorst-den-Berg Radio". Nederhorst-den-Berg is a village near Hilversum in the center of Holland. The reception site, which lays in the Horstermeer nature reserve, was chosen for it's quiet RF environment and excellent ground characteristics with it's natural salt water sources.

Activity will be around the clock, propagation permitting, in CW, SSB or PSK31 on 70cm, 2, 10, 15, 20, 40, 80 and 160 meters. On 160 meters a full-size inverted Eve dipole at 65 meters above very good ground will be used, on 10-20 meters a two-element Yagi 30 meters above the same ground will do the job. Dipoles will be used on 80 and 40 meters. A special QSLcard will be awarded to all contacting stations and will be sent by the bureau automatically.

Once again Doctor Rick, NE8Z, will be operating as HC1MD in Equador through December 11th. Activity will be on 40-10 meters CW/SSB (500 watts) and 6 meters (10 watts). He will travel to different areas in Ecuador and will sign HC1MD, HC1MD/HC2, HC3, HC6 and HC7. QSLvia K8LJG: John Kroll, 3528 Craig Drive, Flint, MI 48506 USA. The #CQDX chat channel is being moved to the WorldIRC network at irc.worldirc.org. Everything is exactly the same; you will just have to reconfigure the address you connect to in your DX-Telnet, mIRC, or other IRC software. Please visit http://dx.qsl.net/cqdx for information and instructions on how to plug the new address into your software. You may email Doug,N6RT at n6rt@qsl.net if you have any questions or problems.

If you are not familiar with #CQDX, it is a popular IRC "chat room" which has been running for over two years. Many DXers, contesters, and everyday hams from all over the world visit this site. Over 5000 different hams from over 170 different countries have visited #CQDX. The channel is also connected directly to DX Summit and broadcasts DX spots, WWVinfo, and announcements. You can find out about #CQDX at http://dx.qsl.net/cqdx.

A DXpedition (of sorts) has been announced to take place December 9-12, signing 1SL1A from Sealand, which is about 7 miles off the coast of England and resembles an off-shore oil rig. Activity will be on 80-10 meters - the WARC bands and 160 meters are being considered. They will be active during the 10 meter DX Contest as well.

It was originally built by the British during WW II to monitor the coast for a possible German invasion. It was later sold to a wealthy British ex-military officer, who has attempted to establish it as sovereignty.

Jon "JT" Utley, K7CO (1SL1J), who will be among the operators states that the license from 'the government' has been issued. He also provided the following: "For those that are wondering about using the prefix 1SL. As some of you know in the past 1S has been used for Spratly. This prefix bloc is not reserved for Spratly, but was used because the area is in dispute over who owns the area. Sealand is also in dispute. We have created the Radio Amateur Association of the Principality of Sealand and our goals are to become a member of the IARU and eventually the ITU."

Don't look for this to gain DXCC recognition, but then you never know. As always, a WFWLapproach should be taken. If nothing else, it should be a good one to grab if you're a prefix collector. For more information and details, see the following Web sites: http://www.sealandgov.com/

Patrick, W3PO (ex F6DWY), is now active as VQ9PO from Chagos primarily on CW on all bands until March 2001. QSLvia W3PO.

Special event stations SP2ØØØS and SN2ØØØC will be active on all bands and modes from Poland until the end of the month December to celebrate the new millennium. QSL SP2ØØØS via SP5ZCC, QSL SN2ØØØC via SP9PKZ.

Gerard, FM/F2JD, now started his six months duty in French Martinique. He also intends to activate neighboring islands on both CW and SSB. QSL via bureau to F6AJA.

Masa,JA6GXK, will be active from Danjo Archipelago (Meshima Island AS-056) several times during the next few months: December 15-25th, January 5-16th, February 6-16th and March 20-30th. However, this is not a DXpedition and Masa will only be active during his spare time. Suggested frequencies are 14260 (+/- 10 kHz) or 21260 (+/- 10 kHz). QSL only via the Bureau.

John, G3IZM, will depart the UK for Manila on December 17th, and will be operational as DU7/G3IZM from Guimeras Island (OC-129) in the Visayan Group between December 19th and January 5th (as swimming and other vacation pursuits permit). His will using be an IC706 MK2G with dipoles over the sea on 20/15 meters CW/SSB. QSL to home callsign.

Takeshi, JI3DST, will be active as JI3DST/6 from Daitou Island (IOTA AS-047) December 30th through January 7th. Activity will be on 40 through 6 meters SSB (including the WARC bands).
