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Remembering the pole:

A very common device that many Hams have used during their experiences in the hobby of Amateur Radio is the Gin Pole. Many amateurs have asked where this device came from and where did the name Gin Pole come from and when.

Gin Pole does not refer to a drink that uses the liquid gin as an ingredient. However, during research I did find fourteen drinks listing gin as a required item. Research suggests the Gin Pole had an English/French origin, dating to around 1447. It was a mechanical apparatus for hoisting heavy weights; a kind of crane (boom) powered by a winch or some form of engine. As time passed the word engine became shortened and known as gin.

A later nautical reference is a small iron sheave, to serve as a pulley for the use of a chain in the discharging of cargo and for other purposes. The chain is led through an engine (gin). On ships the boom or pole is used to move items about. So a Gin Pole started out as an engine driven winch on a pole with pulleys.

Recently, while reviewing the web for some information, I came across a reply to the question, "what is the origin of the term Gin Pole?" On 10-09-99 a Brion Toss replied as follows:

"The term comes, indirectly, from those canes that had the little vial for liquor. And because the cane's owner could be expected to become somewhat rambunctious after repeatedly drinking from said stick, this also led to the phrase "Raising Cane". It was a short translation from cane to crane, the latter even having a little handle-like projection at the top. Liquor wasn't actually kept inside the crane mast, but there was generally lots of it around, so they came to be called "gin poles". And as it happens, the actual story is almost as convoluted, in the wonderful fashion of solid old words. The direct root word appears to be the Latin "Ingenium", natural ability. This branched off into a bunch of different ways, including words like "ingenious", "engine", and "engineer". Other connections include things like "general", "engender", "genius" and "gen-tle". So "gin" in this sense is a foreshorthened form of the OF"engin", which can mean anything from a contrivance or device to snare or trap. "Gin" in this sense is one of those fossilized words; you only see it accompanied by "pole". And it is interesting to note that the ruling word for this class of machines is "crane" which is a poetic sort of word, rooted in the long neck of a bird."

Looking for a single definition of how Gin Pole got that name is somewhat a kin to why are amateur radio operators called Hams. There are a number of answers to the Ham question and probably additional answers to the gin pole story as well. We welcome each and every additional answer.

BAR JOKES


This man was in an accident at home so he filled out an insurance claim. The insurance company contacted him and asked for more information. This was his response:

Due to my surprise of being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot level, I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley. "Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold onto the rope in spite of my pain.

At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of

the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed approximately 20 pounds. I refer you again to my weight in block number 11. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot level I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles, and the lacerations of the legs and lower body. The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell onto the pile of tools. Fortunately, only three vertebra were cracked.

I am sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the tools, in pain, unable to stand, and unable to move, and watching the empty barrel 80 feet above me, I again lost my presence of mind and let go of the rope."



Activities on the HF **Bands** by: Peter Barr

Electronic QSLing is quickly becoming a reality, spear-headed by the ARRL's 'Logbook of the World' Project. At the heart of the Logbook of the World concept is a huge repository of log data provided by operators -- from individual DXers and contesters to major DXpeditions--and maintained by ARRL. The system will benefit big and little guns alike by providing quick QSO credit for awards offered by ARRL, and, it's hoped, for awards offered by other organizations as well.

Once it becomes available (which could be as early as the middle of next year) Logbook of the World will accept authenticated data directly from computerized logs via the Internet. "This is an email based system that uses easy-to-obtain digital signatures for authentication," Mills said. "Once you get your digital certificate, a few keystrokes will do the trick."

The program will offer user access to the LOTW" confirmed database" so an operator can see what "matches" turn up, such as confirmation of new DXCC entities, states or grid squares. The ARRL will publish a list of logs that have been submitted, and operators may access the LOTW database once they've uploaded their own log data.

Heading up software development is ARRL Electronic Publications Manager Jon Bloom, KE3Z, along with Web Applications Developer, Mark Simcik, WA1VVB. Software specifications already have been established. Advising the project are Darryl Wagoner, WA1GON, Dick Green, WC1M and Ted Demopoulos, KR1G. ARRLstaffer and well-known contester and DXer Dave Patton,NT1N who conducted the original electronic QSL project study, is also assisting.

The league hopes to be able to announce a specific inauguration date for the program within a few months, as the software design progresses

Fast on the heels of approval of the "Logbook of the World" by the ARRLBoard of Directors, software design to support the electronic contact-verification program is continuing quickly. The ARRLhopes soon to make LOTW software modules available to vendors for incorporation into their logging programs. These modules are being developed as part of the Trusted QSL opensource project, headed by WA1GON. (More information about the Trusted QSL project can be found at sourceforge.net/projects/trustedqsl.

Marcel,ON4QM/FOØDEH, will once again be active from French Polynesia and the Austral Islands, possibly the same dates as last year (Sept. 25th through Nov. 25th). He will be active from Pukapuka (OC-062) in the Tuamotu Island group, then from Rapa (OC-051) in the Australes and may be again from Reao (OC-238) in the Tuamotu.

A Dutch team will be active as LX9SW in Luxembourg from September 15-22nd. They will concentrate on CW and SSB, 160-10 meters, but there will also be active on RTTY and PSK31. Suggested frequencies are (+/- QRM):

CW - 1820, 3520, 7020, 10120, 14060, 18070, 21020, 24900, 28020

SSB - 1845, 3785, 7080, 14185, 18150, 21280, 24950, 28480 They will listen up 5 kHz. QSL via PA1KW. QSL is OK by the bureau or direct with an IRC or 1 greenstamp.

Chris,GØWFH, plans to operate from Jersey Island (GJ) October 17-31 as GH4BJC/P. He plans to concentrate on 160M SSB. He even has his expected operating times:

October 18: 23ØØZ-Ø3ØØZ October 21: 19ØØZ- 24ØØZ. October 22: 23ØØZ-Ø5ØØZ October 27: 23ØØZ-Ø6ØØZ October 28: 22ØØZ-Ø4ØØZ October 29: 22ØØZ-Ø2ØØZ

Obviously, if the time extends beyond 24ØØZ/ØØØØZ the ending time is on the following calendar day. Also, T5AR (Somalia) has been approved for DXCC credit. It was on the bad list for lack of documentation. The documentation has been reviewed and it is OK. People can now receive DXCC credit. Anyone who has submitted it and had it rejected can contact the DXCC Desk and they'll be able to update their record without having to submit the card again. If not, it can be sent in with your next submission.

Bill Moore, NC1L, DXCC Manager, reminds everyone, "Once again, the cutoff to be shown in the 2001 yearbook is rapidly approaching. In order to be shown you must have a submission in between October 1, 2000 and September 30, 2001. If you have not submitted and you are not current on the DXCC Honor Roll, you will need to make a submission on or by September 30, 2001. Note, the submission must be in our hands by this date, not postmarked. In 2001, September 30 is a Sunday, so applications received in October 1, only, can be credited for September 30. In order to receive the free copy you must: 1)Be an ARRL member. 2) Be current on the DXCC Honor Roll (325 current entities) or, if not on the Honor Roll you must submit an application by September 30, 2001. The yearbook will be out in the spring of 2002. If you do not qualify for the free copy, it can be purchased for \$5.00 each. Previous editions are available starting from 1993 for \$5 each (includes shipping)."
