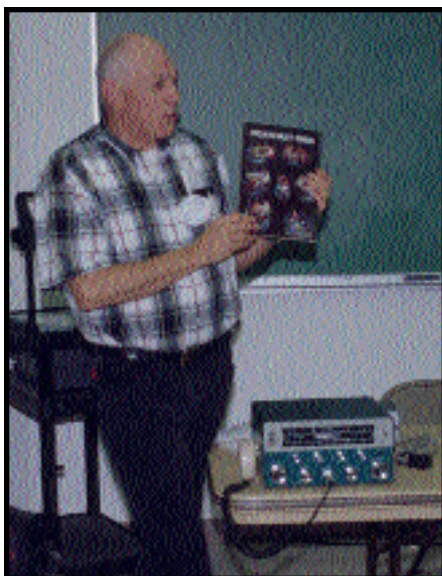

As soon as the 220 machine gets a PL installed and the new tower at COD is back up we will be moving that machine from WA9E's tower back to COD.

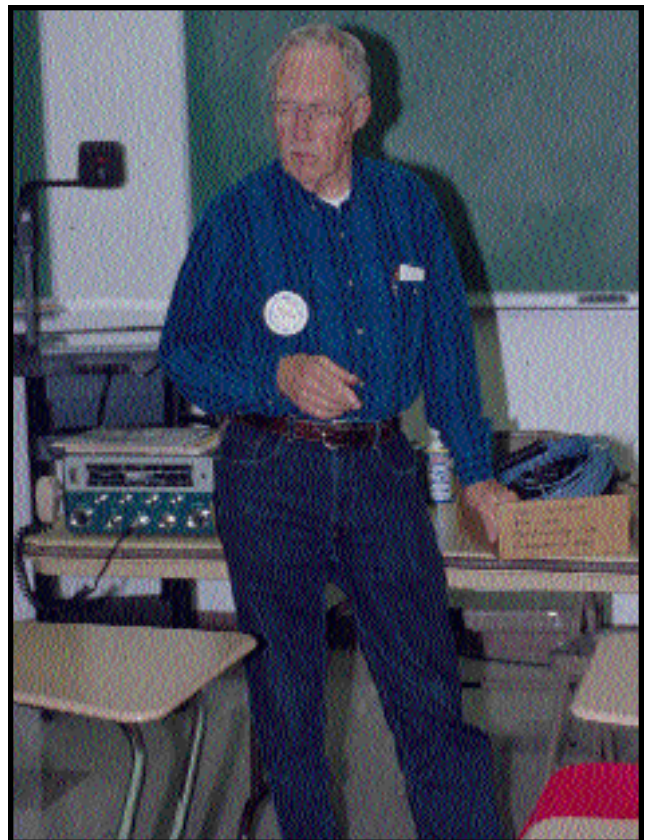

Activities on the HF Bands

There has been some confusion by DXers around the world thinking they are working Mount Athos with the use of the special "SY" prefix by Greek amateurs. The Greek Communications Authority has been issuing the "SY" prefix for special event stations in Greece (SV). However, Monk Apollo reports that he has been receiving QSL requests for these contacts. He has been returning the QSLs explaining that their contacts were not from Mount Athos. But, he states many don't believe him. Monk Apollo has tried to explain to the Greek authorities that the "SY" prefix has always been the alternate Prefix for Mount Athos. Some many may remember that Monk Apollo used the SY2A callsign for a few months in 1999 as a special

event. He is quite suprised that the authorities in Greece do not understand that the "SY" prefix signifies that he is on Mount Athos and that radio amateurs world-wide will assume the same when they hear it. Monk Apollo is still in contact with the Greek licensing authority and will continue to try to convince them to stop further "SY" issued callsigns.

After weather conditions near Ducie Island did not permit landing in November, the Pitcairn Island Amateur Radio Association announces that all planning is now complete for their second attempt to activate Ducie Island. The island became a new entity on the ARRL DXCC List as of November 16, 2001, and has not yet been activated. The DXpedition will depart from Mangareva on March 12 in the ship Braveheart, which is more adequate for the task. They will use a VP6 callsign to be announced at the beginning of the operation, and plan to be operational as soon as possible after arriving upon the island. Those who wish to keep up with the progress of the DXpedition as they move to the island may check 21.260 Mhz for Maritime Mobile operation.

The group's operating plan is intended to provide contacts with as many different Amateur Radio operators as possible during their stay on the island. The band plan is as follows: 21.020 MHz (CW) and 21.295 MHz (SSB) will be QRV 24 hours each day. This is to allow more individuals to find and work the group, depending upon propagation to their area. 28.495 MHz, and 14.195 MHz will be the prime SSB frequencies, and 14.020 MHz will be the prime CW frequency other than 15 meters. There be some operation on all bands, 160 through 6 meters, with some RTTY in addition to SSB and CW operations. However, it's expected that Low Band and WARC operations are more likely to take place in the last days of the operation, as concentration from the beginning will be to allow as many operators as possible to work this new DXCC Entity.

Antennas will be a 2 element HB9CV on 10 and 15 meters, a 4 Square for 20 meters, and wire and vertical antennas for the other bands. There will be a 6 meter beacon on 50.110 Mhz. Operators will be: VP6TC, VP6DB, VP6AZ, VP6MW, VP6BK/JA1BK, JF1IST, JA3USA, K9AJ and K5VT. Randy (an SWL) will be going to provide additional logistical support. Other operators may be chosen prior to departure.

While stations that dupe the operation will not be blacklisted, it is recommended that once you hear your call coming back that you not work the station again on that band and mode so that others will have an opportunity. Log checks will be available at www.big.or.jp/~ham/dx.html.

The Yaesu Division of Vertex Standard and FTI are providing equipment support for this operation. In

addition, an ARRL Colvin Grant has been made to PIARA to help with the Ducie venture. At present, no other foundation or club support has been received and any donations will be gratefully accepted. For the latest updates on this operation, it is recommend to watch the following Web sites:

Adam, VK4CP (VK9ML Pilot/Webmaster) reports that the VK9ML DXpedition team is interested in comments regarding whether they should run PSK-31, RTTY, or neither during their DXpedition to Mellish Reef in April 2002. RTTY and PSK-31 both have pros and cons, and they are simply asking which mode you would prefer them to operate on. If neither is desirable, then, of course, they can spend more time concentrating on CW and SSB operation. Let them know your thoughts in the Poll that they are conducting. Hrane, YT1AD and Voja, YU7AV returned home unsuccessfully from North Korea at the end of December after being unable to get permission to operate. But they say they have a license to operate from North Korea with two additional operators starting March 5th of this year. Hrane and Voja will be asked to train at least 20 new North Korean ham operators. They promise more details will follow. Meanwhile, Ed, P5/4L4FN left Pyongyang, North Korea on December 24th for the holidays after making 3,004 QSOs on 10, 15 and 20M SSB. Ed should be back in country by the time you are reading this.

Hrane will also soon lead a team to Baker Island (KH1). His team plans to set sail from the Fiji Islands on April 25. This will be the first expedition to operate from Baker Island. All previous expeditions were from Howland Island. The trip is expected to take 6 days to get to this rare island via the Princess II, a 92-foot motor boat, which is capable of 9 knots. The group will stay for 10 days and plan to be on all bands.

Equipment will include six radios, three ACOM 100, two 400-watt amps, two 5KW generators, two 2KW generators, three yagi beams (10-30 MHz), three verticals (160/80/40) and a 5-element M2 50 MHz beam. The

team expects to be QRV on 6-160 meters on CW, SSB, RTTY, PSK, SSTV and Satellite.

After the DXpedition the team will head back to the Fiji Islands and then on to the Dayton Hamvention. The DXpedition is expected to cost \$90,000 and donations are being sought. More details will be announced here as we get closer to the date.

David, A92GE has announced that Bahrain lost a number of amateurs in recent months and advises that at the present time the only active amateurs are A92EV (10, 15 and 20 meters), A92GE (10 through 20 meters including WARC bands) and A92ZE (LF bands only). A92DQ and A92FF have callsigns and attend meetings but are not active due to equipment/antenna problems. A92C, the club station is active only on Tuesday evenings when there is a club meeting. There are two new arrivals that are waiting for calls to be allocated.

Mirosław Stefansky is expected to be active as HFØPOL from the Polish base "Hanryk Arctowsky" on King George Island (AN-010) in the Shetlands through December 31st, 2002. He plans to operate CW/RTTY/PSK-31 on all bands, WARC included. Watch for him on the usual DX frequencies. QSL via SQ5TA.

Dr. Rick Dorsch, NE8Z/HC1MD, will be going back to Ecuador from February 1-16, 2002. He'll take a TS-850, SB200, 3-element tri-bander and Carolina Windom for activity on 10-80 CW and SSB. Rick plans to be active with the following calls from the following QTHs.

Paolo Cortese, I2UIY says plans for his expedition to Niger, Africa are firming up. Airline tickets are now in hand for the February 3-18 operation. Seven operators will keep three stations on the air on SSB, CW, RTTY and PSK31, 160-6M. A station will be on 160/80 every night. Their web site is <http://www.qsl.net/niger-2002>.

GJ6UW will be on from Jersey, the Channel Islands, the afternoon of February 15 to the morning of February 17, 2002. Jersey is EU-013 for the IOTA award. Ops will be G3ZAY, Martin Atherton and MØBLF, Dominic Smith. Their 160M antenna should be a dipole on a 750-foot-high cliff overlooking salt water. They will be on 160-6. QSL to MØBLF direct

TI5KC in Heredia, Costa Rica will be manned by operator KE0UI, Bob, February 18-27. He plans to be on all HF bands and 6 but will concentrate on CW on the WARC bands. The web page is <http://www.qsl.net/ti5kd>. Bob will be on in the UBA CW Contest February 23 as TI5N. QSL to his home call or the U.S. bureau.

Mirek, VK3DXI/9V1XE/SP5IXI, says he has just gotten a letter from the Ministry of Communications in Algeria and the Ministry of Defense has no problems with issuing him a license. It's just a formality from now on he says. Mirek expects to take equipment to Algeria at the beginning of January. The Ministry of Communications has to inspect the station, and then he hopes to begin operating in the middle or end of January.

Mirek will come and go to and from Algeria through at least March, 2002.

The VK9WI (2000) and VK9ML (2001) team are planning to go back to Mellish Reef next year. The group announced they plan to be QRV again as VK9ML from April 12 to 22. They expect to operate on 6 through 160 meters CW and SSB. Check out their web site at <http://www.qsl.net/vk9ml/2002/>.

Nick, VK1AA (ex VK2ICV), is in the final stages of preparation for a DXpedition to Temotu Province (H4Ø). Past operations have concentrated on the higher bands, so Nick will spend as much time as possible on low bands from March 28 to April 12. Unfortunately due to the strict baggage limits of only 16 kg he had make special arrangements (costly) with the airline to allow him to take a vertical for 80/160 meters and an amplifier. Members of the Oita DX Club JA6BTO (KHØ/JA6BTO), JA6HJP (KF4LX/AHØ), JA6LZN (KHØ/JA6LZN), JA6PBO (KK7UB/KHØ), JA6VQA(WHØB) and JH6ALF (AB2GA/KHØ) will be active (especially on 160 meters, 80/40 meters, the WARC band, 6 meters, CW,SSB,SSTV,RTTY) from Saipan, Northern Mariana Islands (OC-086), February 7-10th. After spending the holidays with family in the U.S., Eric,N1JSY is now back in Western Kiribati as T3ØES. Eric works for the Peace Corps. He hopes to put up an inverted vee as his second antenna on the island of Butaritari and is obtaining a higher capacity battery, giving him more operating time. His battery is charged daily by solar panels. He favors 14288 at 14ØØz Saturdays and 183Øz Thursdays. In December, Eric used ham radio to coordinate evacuation of a Kiribati woman having trouble with childbirth. Mother and child are doing well in a Tarawa hospital. Gus,9U5D was very active from Burundi on 12 meters (around 24988 kHz between 1830 and 2130z). If he is not on 12 meters check 20 meters (around 14185 kHz). YL operator Mechita,DPØGVN may be getting on from the German base in Antarctica. Another possibility is Sepp,DPØLEX from a second German Antarctic base. Look for them on 21275 at 17ØØz Mondays.

The new \$1.75 IRCs should be in all US Post Offices soon. The major item that was changed, other than the price, was that the new ones all bear an expiration date. Postmaster Dennis Egan,NB1B was told the date is January 31, 2006. "After that date, they will be not be accepted for exchange", reports Egan.

South Koreans will have a special callsign on the air: HL17FWC, to commemorate the FIFA World Football Cup, through May 30. QSL to HLØHQ, the Korean Amateur Radio League headquarters, CPO Box 162, Seoul, Korea. All the Korean Hams will change their callsign during the game period (May 31st-June 30th) as the follows:

HL1ABC ---> HL17ABC
DS1ABC ---> DS17ABC/1 (Because they have five DS#ABC)
6K2ABC ---> 6K17ABC/2
Club stations DSØAB, 6KØAB, 6LØAB, 6MØAB, D7ØAB and
D8ØAB will change their Ø (zeros) to 17.

The KARL is planning to make a special award for this event. Details will be forthcoming.

CNN reported early in January that ethnic Kazakh villagers living along the unmarked border between Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan declared their settlements an independent nation. The disputed areas of Bagys vilage, Turkestan vilage and Arnasai region have frustrated villagers for some time now after the demarcation between the two former Soviet republics. The three areas represent about 4% of the border, which remains undefined. Last week 500 people from the two vilages rallied together and voted on independence. The group leader Oral Saulebai was arrested by Uzbek police and handed over to Kazakh authorities. Officials plan to complete the demarcation of the border before July. Could be a another new one to look for!

The operators are running a fully equipped station on all bands/modes in order to promote the event and also as an incentive to the local people to learn about ham radio as a hobby. Special attention will be given to the WARC bands. Color QSL cards will be managed via PY2AE (qrz.com) after the event.

HG8ØST will be active all bands, CW, SSB and RTTY from Hungary until February 28. The operation celebrates the 80th anniversary of the town of Salgotarjan. QSL to HA6KNB, Radioclub Salgotarjan, P.O. Box 115, H-3101 Salgotarjan, Hungary or through the bureau. Special postage stamps will be used to answer direct requests.

LA5QFA and LA8AJA will be on 160-6 CW, SSB and possibly RTTY from the JW5E clubhouse in Longyearbyen, Svalbard (EU-026) January 14-20. They will use the JW4X callsign on 6M, 50.145 and JW5QFA and JW8AJA on HF. Their 6M beacon will be on 50.080. QSL JW4X and JW5QFA via LA6EIA and JW8AJA via LA8AJA.
