From the President's Gavel

Dear Fellow Members:

Summer time is just around the corner, and your executive board has been working on the not-sofun but necessary issue of the club budget. For those of you that attended the May meeting (which actually happened on the last day of April), you might remember that Joe (N9WRO) had asked that the executive board consider a resolution to require a balanced budget each fiscal year. Certainly, we are working towards that goal, and have focused on the items in the club budget looking for areas where we can cut expenses. Jack (our treasurer) has spent a great deal of time and effort working on reducing our insurance costs, and has come up with some savings there. The largest savings could come from a reduced rate on the club truck, but at this point, we have paid for insuring the club truck through next January, and we're not sure how much savings we would realize for this year, as our current insurance provider would refund us a small portion of what we have paid this year. On the other side of that coin, the next time we pay for truck insurance would be in January 2005, and due to cash flow considerations, it seems most prudent to change the insurance closer to the time it is up for renewal. The executive board did vote 4-1 to change the club's other (Continued on page 3)





WCRA Meeting Minutes for the May 2004 Meeting held on April 30

President **Mike**, **AB9AX**, called the meeting to order at 19:32. Introductions were made by the board and all in attendance. **Joe**, **N9WRO**, made a motion to accept the minutes of the previous meeting and **John**, **N9LIN**, seconded it. A vote was taken and the motion carried. Mike thanked members for re-electing him, and announced that **Mary**, **K9GAL**, had been elected secretary. Vice President, **Steve**, **N9OA**, reported that the June meeting will be held in Room 250 (instead of #138) of the Billy Graham Center because of a schedule conflict with Wheaton College. Steve

announced that tonight's program will be on voice operating procedures for public service events presented by N9WRO. The June program will be on Field Day. Treasurer, Jack, KA9HEL, gave a report on current finances. Hamfest, Bruce, K9OZ, reported that fliers will be printed and distributed next month. He said the committee still needs co-chairs for the Hamfest and Flea market and a chair for Tickets. Public Service, Joe, N9WRO reported on the Special Olympics that was held on April 25 and announced the MS Walkathon would be held May 2. He reported on the Wheaton Fourth of July parade and the Glendale Heights parade scheduled for August 28. RAB, **Don**, **N9NYX**, presented a detailed report on the background and status of College of DuPage and the repeater antennas. Concerns about the tower site being wetlands have slowed the project dramatically. Don said there will be a new contact person soon that might be able to facilitate resolution of this matter, but he could not give an estimated time of installation. Don said he had received indication that the 440 machine was not operating well and that the RAB may need to make a visit to the site and tweak the repeater. Training, Jack, KA9HEL, said he will talk to his contacts at COD about the club's classes held at the college. Field Day, Dale, NJ9E, announced that this year's station captains must be current on their WCRA membership. Field Day, Peter, N9HDW, said a clipboard was being passed around for volunteers to sign up on. Custodian, Roberto, WA9E, gave a report on the club truck usage and P.O. box. Newsletter, Don, N9NYX, reported he still needs volunteers to print and mail the Hamletter to those without internet access. He said contributors to Shack of the Month would be appreciated. N9WRO made a motion that the committee reports be accepted. Marty, N9NTM, seconded the motion. A vote was taken and it carried. Old Business: Don announced that the nominating committee is still looking for someone to run for the custodian position. New Business: Jack, KA9HEL, presented a proposed budget for 2004. He explained that the club needs to figure out ways to cut costs. There was a long discussion about the budget and much of it centered around the club truck. N9WRO asked whether the board had considered having a balanced budget requirement in the by-laws. Mike, AB9AX, said the board would take it under advisement. N9NTM made a motion that the meeting be adjourned. Paul, KA9RVS, seconded the motion, a vote was taken and it carried. The meeting was adjourned at 21:17.

Hamfest Report -- the elephant in the room

There is a big elephant in the room at every club meeting. Nobody seems to want to talk about it, so here goes. As Hamfest chairman – somebody who is putting in many, many hours to raise money for the club -- I'm trying to start meaningful dialog among club members on a pressing problem.

Our membership is shrinking. Every year it is shrinking. This shrinkage can be attributed to many factors, but the club is not marketing its membership to anyone – including current members. A decision was made several years ago to quit mailing the newsletter to members to cut costs. That's about the time membership accelerated its nosedive. Why would anyone pay membership, if they get nothing in return?

Putting a PDF file on the web and expecting people to download it is not publishing a newsletter. A newsletter is delivered, whether its by mail or e-mail, it's delivered to every member and prospective members. This is not the place to cut the budget – this is membership recruitment and retention. Without that, the club will cease to exist.

Meanwhile, we should be a wealthy club. We have a franchise – a hamfest that can return \$4,000 to \$6,000 to the club's coffers each year. It takes some work, but most clubs would give their eyeteeth for that type of income.

Where is the money going? The truck. The truck will sink the club at the current rate it is going. Insurance for the truck is \$2,000 a year. Storage is \$69 a month. Last year we spent \$4,000 on the truck. So all of the hamfest income is going to maintaining a truck that gets trotted out for special events and Field Day.

Yes it's nice to have, but it's not worth \$4,000 a year. Special events can be handled by a mobile station or a quick portable setup. Field day can be handled with portable generators. Sell the truck – someone will buy it for the generator – and put that money into a storage trailer and portable generators.

Emergency preparedness – yes that takes a hit. But is the truck, in its current state of mechanical repair, really an emergency preparedness vehicle? It's only a matter of time until some other major thing malfunctions on the truck. Then we are faced with throwing more money down the black hole. I'm not anti-truck. I've used it, I've driven it, I've helped clean it and I've crawled underneath it with a wrench in my hand. It is nice to have, but not something we can afford to maintain.

In the last two years as Hamfest Chairman I've turned in more than \$10,000 to the club's coffers. Where has that money gone? The majority of it to the truck. So I've put in a lot of hours to keep the truck afloat financially. That's why I'm making my voice heard.

I operate the Hamfest off a budget. I had budgeted for \$6,000 profit last year at Kane County and exceeded that. I budgeted for \$4,000 profit at Pheasant Run and exceeded that. I have a budget for \$4,000 profit next year, which should be easily attainable, even with the higher rent.

The new board should act immediately to formulate a solvent budget for the club that does not include \$4,000 a year for maintaining the truck. It should include a healthy amount -- \$2,000 -- for mailing a newsletter to current and prospective club members. Membership recruitment and retention is key to survival of the club. Maintaining an old truck will kill the club if something isn't done.

There is a very good chance that Alex will have activated VP8SGB by now. He only operates SSB and does not have a lot of experience with pileups. Look for him probably on 20 meters after 1800Z. QSL via GMØHCQ.

Oleg,XU7ARA in Cambodia reports several openings to the US in May after 13ØØz. He has also been very active on 3.507 and 7.007 between 213Ø and 23ØØz. He reports usually having 59+20db local QRM 160. QSL via ES1RA.

Frank, VO2/VA2RC will be on the air from

Labrador City (CQ WAZ Zone 2) on July 31st and August 1st. Activity will be on 10, 15, 20, 40 and 80 meters on SSB and RTTY. Suggested frequencies are as follows: SSB – 3.790-3.795, 7.050-7.060, 14.185-14.200, 21.250-21.275 and 28.420-28.450 RTTY – 3.580-3.600, 7.040-7.050, 14.085-14.090, 21.085-21.090 and 28.090-28.100. CT9X will be on from Madeira's Porto Santo, AF-014, for the IOTA Contest July 24-25. Operators will be Luis, CT1AGF; Antonio, CT1EPV; Luis, CT3EE; Herman, CT3FN(HB9CRV); Jose, CT3MD; Juergen, DJ2VO; Derek, G3KHZ; Toni, HB9EBV and Rajean, VA2AM. QSL to Kim Larson via N3SL.

II5MD will be a special event station from the ARI Versilia club June 11-13 to honor telephone pioneer Antonio Meucci for "Meucci Day."

SJ9WL and LG5LG will be the Morokulien callsign on the air the last week of May 24 through June 2 including the WPX CW contest. Morokulien is on the border of Sweden and Norway and either the special Swedish or special Norwegian callsign may be used from there. Operators will be Roel,DL3KWR, and Hardy,DL3KWF. QSL both of these callsigns via SM5DJZ.

Bob,N6OX, Bob, is making his second trip to Belarus and has his EW/N6OX license. He will be on all bands SSB and RTTY June 14-22. He will operate for two days in Moscow as R3/N6OX on the way to Belarus. QSL both via EU7SA.

Mike,AD5A and Michael,AB5EB will go portable /VO2 from zone two and Battle Island, Labrador, NA-Ø44, June 19-21, 80-10M including WARC, CW and SSB. They will have two stations with solid state 300- 400 watt amps to verticals. QSL via N6AWD.

The UK's Cray Valley Radio Society, CVRS, will have a group on St. Mary's, Isles of Scilly, EU-Ø11 July 21-25. In the IOTA contest they will sign M8C. The rest of the time, GØVJG, M3CVN, G4BUO, GØFDZ, 2EØATY and G7GLW will put /p behind their call, or use the G3RCV/p callsign. QSL via G4DFI.

Aru,JAØKNM; Jun,JJ1EQW; and Kai,JE3NJZ are traveling to Yonaguni, AS-Ø24, the westernmost Japanese island, to operate June 4-7. They will each sign their callsign /JR6. Look for them on 40-2M CW, SSB, 6M AM, and RTTY. QSL to their home calls.

TM7BDX will be the callsign for a one-day operation from Cordouan Island, EU-159, June 12th. Operations will take place on 40- 10M CW and SSB. Operators will be F2VX, F5OZF, F5RXL, F5SSG, F6EXV and F8BBL. QSL via F8BBL.

Special event callsign EO60FO has been issued in the Ukraine to celebrate the liberation of Odessa region in WWII. Activity will last until August 27th and will start from Odessa City and then all 26 regions

accordingly to the date of their liberation back in 1944. Activity will be on all bands/modes. QSL via the Ukrainian Bureau.

OPDX has announced that all stations in Slovenia are allowed to use additional "Ø4" in their prefix to celebrate the new members entering the European Union (ex. S5500 can use the callsign S5Ø4500, S56A S5Ø46A etc....). Also, the ZRS will be active with the special callsign S52ØØ

Jose,N4BAA, who is in the Navy, is on his way to the Persian Gulf again. He has the following licenses and will be operating as YI9BAA, 9K2/N4BAA, and A92/N4BAA starting around July 29th and will be in the area until November 15th. Jose states that he will be emphasizing 160-40 meters CW and a little RTTY on 20 meters.

Ken Holdom,ZL4HU (Group Organizer/Team Leader/QSL Manager), member of the Kermadec DX Association, reports the issue of commemorative envelopes for the ZL9CI DXpedition in January 1999 was one of the significant milestones for this record setting DXpedition. The Kermadec DX Association has a small limited supply of these envelopes left, and they are anxious to find a good home for these amongst the very finest of collectors, DXers, and others worldwide. Look for special event station TM6MKI to be active June 1-14th, from the Panazol and Haute Vienne area (Limousin Province, France), for the 60th anniversary of the Landing in Normandy. (D-Day, 6th of June 1944). This activity also commemorates the killing of most of the inhabitants in the village of Oradour sur Glane, who where shot and burnt in a church (10th of June 1944), by the "Das Reich" SS division, in retaliation of partisans actions. The suffix "MKI" has been chosen to symbolize the famous transceiver "MKII" used by the partisans during WWII. Some TM6MKI activities are scheduled using an original MKII transceiver, on June 5th and 6th. QSL per operator's instruction.

Vincent,F5MJV, who is a member of the French Navy, will be departing Europe for the French Polynesian territories (Tahiti, Marquesas and Astrals) for a one year stint, starting on July 1st. He has requested a FO5 callsign. Vincent will be running 100 watts and a vertical antenna when operating from a boat. Most activity will be on CW. He will also be operating from several islands with the same set up. Both rare and semi-rare IOTA stops are expected along with stops from several other Pacific Ocean countries (ZL, 3D, W6, KH6, VK). He has a Web page (in French) at http://f5mjv.com. QSL via F5NQL (either direct with SAE + postage or via the French REF Bureau)

Many noticed ZA/OH2BH and ZA/OH2PM signals bouncing in from Albania last month. Indeed, some 6000 QSOs were made--not only to please the "Deserving", but also to remind us about our shared responsibility to help those in need. This time, five stations were fully equipped: ZA1BH, ZA1BS, ZA1DC, ZA1DJ and ZA1S. These callsigns were launched into the battle and these fine people made their first radio contact to the world. Signals reached all parts of the world with ease and also many U.S stations were on hand to experience the first day of operation by these Albanian operators. Radio equipment was donated by W3UR, K9MM, G3TXF, EA2NO and OH2PM, but many more recently licensed ZA hams are still in need of any gear to bring more ZA signals to the bands and make the Albanians welcome to this great passion of ours. Dave Anderson,K4SV and Neil King,VA7DX announced in Mid May that they would be returning to Africa this summer. Dubbed "Africa Triple Hop DXpedition 2004," the operation will take place between July 28 and August 17. Dave and Neil will operate from Lesotho July 29th to August 6th, Swaziland August 7th to August 11th and Mozambique August 12th to August 17th. They will be QRV on 10 through 160 meters on CW, SSB, RTTY and other digital modes. Activity will be subject to daily propagation conditions, with a focus on the low bands, nightly. Special effort will be made to work the US general portion of the bands. Verticals will be used on 30-160 meters with 4 element A4S and WARC beams at 75 feet for the higher bands. Last years call-

signs will be reactivated with Dave using 7P8DA and 3DAØSV and Neil will use 7P8NK and 3DAØWC. Their calls for Mozambique have yet to be announced, but will be posted on the net.
