

WCRA Minutes from the February 4, 2005 Meeting

Vice President and Acting President Steve, N9OA, called the meeting to order at 19:31. Kurt, KB9RTO, made a motion that the minutes of the last meeting be accepted. Peter, N9HDW, seconded the motion, and it passed. In announcements, Steve said, "We need a president!" Speaking as Vice President, Steve said there is no program for February. He asked for program ideas. Some possibilities are weather spotting and pedestrian mobile, which will be presented in March or May. Steve thanked Pat, K9JAU, for bringing refreshments.

Board and attendees made introductions. Secretary Mary, K9GAL, presented a new membership application for Rick, N9HLG. John, N9MWF, made a motion that the new member be accepted, Bob, N9BR, seconded the motion, and it passed. Mary asked for help on Membership. Wini, KC9BJJ, volunteered. Treasurer Jack, KA9HEL, reported on the budget and told members he would like to resign. Marty, N9NTM, made a motion that the treasurer's report be accepted, Doug, W9NJM, seconded the motion, and it passed. No action was taken on the resignation request.

Hamfest **Bruce**, **K9OZ**, said this year's profits were down dramatically because of the snow. However, the committee "really watched expenses," so profits were better than they could have been. **Tom**, **N9WBW**, asked that the minutes reflect what a great job the committee did on Hamfest--especially Bruce, John, Peter and Kurt. John, N9MWF, made a motion, Wini seconded the motion and it passed. Workers' prizes were awarded. John announced that his grand prize winnings from Hamfest will be donated to the club's Emergency Preparedness efforts.

In Field Day news, Peter reported 10 people had showed up for the New Techniques and Technology before this meeting. **Dale, NJ9E**, reported that the group is hoping to find a new location for Field Day to be held June 25-26, 2005. Representing the Repeater Administrative Board, **Larry, KA9KDC**, said there had been activity on the tower at College of DuPage. A wireless company is interested in putting an antenna up there; this could be a good sign for the club and its antenna. Larry invited members to look at photos he had brought of the cabinet that he has built around the repeater in its temporary location (his home).

Kurt announced the Salvation Army is looking for a liaison officer for DuPage County. Anyone interested can see Kurt.

Doug made a motion the meeting be adjourned, John seconded it. The motion passed, and the meeting was adjourned at 20:58.

Five great building projects, complete with color illustrations and parts lists. Even if you don't need the items, it's fun to follow the authors through their construction adventures.

PORTABLE J-POLE

Page 31 gives you step-by-step instructions to build a "Portable J-Pole" for only \$15! Every WCRA member needs a fold-up/pop-up 2-meter antenna. Cleverly designed with a bungee cord inside, the copper tubing springs to life and you are radiating! Author Mike Heiler, KA0ZLG, is a Minnesota area Emergency Coordinator. If you get into problems with assembly, email him at ka0zlg@arrl.net

BAND YAGI

More complicated, but certainly an elegant device to have for your shack is KC6T's Beam for 10/15/20 meters with "backwards" coverage of 12! Leave it to those Californians to figure that out. It has a total weight of 65 pounds and read the four pages beginning on page 34 for the details. Bill Stein is a computer peripheral expert and loves HF, and reports ideal working height of 37 feet for this beauty.

FLEXIBLE MOBILE ANTENNA

On page 53 you can read about a mobile antenna installation that boggles the mind. Using PVC and a lot of ingenuity, Bob Schetgen, KU7G, has created a platform on his '93 Subaru wagon that his wife calls "The Plumber's Mobile." He needed to support one of those big fold-over masts, and the sheet metal of the car wouldn't take it. Thus the "structure" he put together. You'll enjoy his rising to the challenge.

APARTMENT ANTENNA GROUNDING SOLUTION

On the same page 53, another ham has solved the problem of cave dwellers to need to ground their rigs to get efficient radiation. His solution—copper foil and 73 empty beer cans arrayed on the floor and connected to the foil by wire with alligator clips on the pull tabs. He's four floors up and uses a 20-meter dipole connected to a nearby tree. He claims to get great DX with only a 100 watts.

BATTERY PACK FOR PORTABLE OPERATION

Phil Salas, AD5X, has come up with a low-cost solution to battery pack construction; he picked up a couple of Radio Control batteries and a smart charger for \$56.95! That is the foundation of the system he put together for his away from home operation. The details are on pages 51 and 52.

Army Rules For Gunfights


- 1. Select a new beret to wear

Bernie, W3UR has received a report on the December 2004 DXpedition that turned into a relief effort when the tsunami hit the Andaman and Nicobar Islands in late last year. The report was written by VU2MYH. The story is in a PDF file (1.2 meg size) and includes photos. It can be downloaded from his web site at http://www.dailydx.com/VU4.htm. Also the April issue of How's DX in QST (written by Bernie) will be on the VU4 DXpedition, turned relief effort.

The Clipperton DXpedition team has received official written clearance to organize a 2005 Glorioso DXpedition. They will use the prefix "TO4G**" and be active between May 15th and June 1st. Activity will be on 160-6 meters, on CW, SSB and Digital modes. Operators mentioned are: Didier, F5OGL (leader); Christian, TZ6SA; Dany, F5CW; Eric, FM5JC; Pascal, F5PTM; Freddy, F5IRO; Yves, F5MSR; Vicent, /F8UNF; Luc, FR5IZ; JeanLuc, F5AEP; Olivier, F1AAK and David, FØCRS. The QSL Manager is Didier, F5OGL. QSL via the REF Bureau or direct to: Didier Senmartin, Boite postale 7, F-53320 Loiron, FRANCE. Eddie, DU1EV, informs OPDX that Nicodemus, DU1JXP; Mike, DU1MHX; Ed, 4F1OZ; Gilbert, 4F2KWT; Bebe, 4F3BA and himself will be active on the Philippine side of the Spratly Island Group (Kalayaan Island) from January to May under the callsign DXØK. According to Eddie, he should be on the air and be active by himself for about a month. Towards the end of March 2 or 3 other operators are expected to join for around three weeks. Eddie mentions that they might pack up early after two weeks, or towards the tail end of April, as the typhoon season will be about to set in and they will be leaving there by boat. Activity is planned for all bands 160-6 meters including the WARC bands, mostly on CW and SSB. During March they "just might" work some digital modes like RTTY and SSTV. Eddie also mentions that this is a Hamcation/ DXpedition, and these are their tentative plans. A Web page is in the planning stage. QSL Manager is 4F2KWT.

Pierre, F6FXS and his XYL will be vacationing on the main Island of Guadeloupe (NA-1Ø2) from March 4-22nd. Pierre will be active as FG/F6FXS, and his activity will be CW only on 40-10 meters. During his holiday style DXpedition, he will use a FT817 and wires. Suggested frequencies are 7.013, 10.115, 14.045, 18.083, 21.045, 24.903 and 28.045 kHz. QSL direct (CBA) or via the bureau.

A Japanese group will be heading to the Pacific islands for their DX-vacation. Activity will be from Majuro Atoll (OC-029) between March 18-28th. Operators mentioned are Shigeo, JA1JQY (V73JY); Hisashi, JA1KJW (V73KJ); Yasumasa, JA1HEE (V73HE) and JI1FPO (V73OP). The team will do their best to make many QSOs with USA stations on 160/80 meters. Activity will be on CW, SSB and RTTY (if possible), using the following suggested frequencies:

CW – 1.822, 3.507, 7.007, 10.107, 14.007, 18.077, 21.007, 24.897 and 28.007

SSB – 3.798, 7.080, 14.170, 18.130, 21.270, 24.940 and 28.470 kHz

Leo, W3LEO is active again this year from Portpatrick, Scotland until March 29. He's currently QRV as MMØLEO and plans to operate in the ARRL International DX SSB Contest (March 5-6) as GM3W, the Wigtownshire ARC contest call. During the CQ WPX SSB Contest (March 26-27) and the rest of the time, he

will use MMØLEO. He's got an Icom 706, an R-5 vertical [10, 12, 15, 17, 20 meters], and a 40 meter dipole. QSL both calls via W3LEO.

Ronald, PA3EWP and Tom, GM4FDM will be in Gibraltar from March 21-28. They hope to operate as ZB2/PA3EWP and ZB2/GM4FDM respectively. Plans are to have antennas for 10-80 meters, and possibly 160 meters. Look for activity on CW, SSB and RTTY. They will be using Elecraft K2s. The two will take part in the CW WPX SSB Contest. QSLs via home calls.

Hamid, EP4HR in Iran states he is usually on the lower bands every day (except Tuesdays and Fridays) from Ø215-Ø23Øz on CW or PSK31. He will start on 160 then move to 80 and 40 meters. QSNs show him on 40 meters PSK31 on 7035 kHz as late as Ø115z. Also, watch 14.070 kHz on PSK31 between 13ØØ-163Øz. OSL via I2MQP.

LX/ON4BAG, LX/ON4LO, LX/ON6QX and LX/ON6UM will be on from Wiltz, Luxembourg April 22-25. They will be on 160-10M, SSB, CW, and digital. QSL via the bureau or the QRZ.COM address.

VE7RLE, Ron Essex, has permission to use the special event callsign VA7C, July 1-31. Ron will celebrate the Centennial of the City of Salmon Arm, British Columbia, Canada. QSL via VE7RLE, Ron Essex, 3691 - 65th Avenue N.W., Salmon Arm, BC V1E 3A5, Canada

Look for Nicola, IØSNY to be signing JT1Y from Mongolia between April 21 and May 10. He will go portable in the Gobi Desert this time as JT1Y/4. QSL to his home call.

A group from Australia plan to operate from St. Peter Island in the Nuyts Archipelago (OC-220) from April 7 to 11. This will be a special event, commemorating the 350th Anniversary of the death of Pieter Nuyts, the Dutch East India Company man and sometime explorer, who died in 1655. Team members will probably include Peter, VK3QI; Keith, VK3FT; Jack, VK3WWW and Max, VK3WT. Look for activity on 15 through 40 meters CW and SSB. A special commemorative callsign has been requested. QSL via VK3QI.

IOTA

Massimo, 9L1MS had to postpone his Turtle Islands, IOTA AF-056, operation that had been planned for February 5-6. I'll try to have more news when updates become available.

MJ/K8PT and MJ/K3PLV will be on the air again from Jersey (IOTA EU- 013) March 9-16. They will both have amplifiers and will be on 160-6M CW, SSB, RTTY and some PSK-31. They will "do at least one allnighter on 80 and 160 meters," and "This year we will accept scheduled contacts. To set one up on CW or RTTY, e-mail: K8PT@chartermi.net, for SSB or PSK-31, e-mail: crahill@adelphia.net." QSL via their home calls.

Kadek, YB9BU, will be active as YB7M from a new IOTA in the Laut Kecil Island Group (Oceana) from March 9-14th. Activity will be from the Moresses Island (Marabatua Island). QSL via YB9BU.

Bill, WB5ZAM, will be active from St. Lucia for 2 weeks. Look for him to sign J6/WB5ZAM from March 20th through April 3rd. Bill states that he is planning to operate on HF, "mostly CW around a laid back schedule." QSL via his home callsign.

The new system shows every issued DXCC award known to ARRL's computerized DXCC system with the exception of individual standings for 5BDXCC. ARRL Membership Services Manager Wayne Mills, N7NG, says the Web site listing is even more complete than the DXCC Yearbook ever was, since the printed list did not list inactive band-accounts for the previous year. "This will list everything and everybody," Mills emphasized. "The new system makes available a separate listing for each DXCC award type-band or mode."

Even more important, Mills notes is that it essentially renders obsolete the manually generated monthly and yearly reports. "Under the new system, DXCC listings will be updated daily," he emphasized. The DXCC standings of all ARRL members will remain in dark type. Call signs of non-members who have not submitted credits for 10 years or more are in grayed-out type. Each listing by band or mode is complete in a separate Adobe PDF file. The largest listing (DXCC Mixed) now runs to more than 50 pages, but the size of the PDF file is only about 150 kbytes because of file compression.
