



Frederic Furrer, HB9CQK will be on from the Seychelles as S79QK April 27-May 8. Frederic will be on Denis Island, IOTA AF-Ø24 and Alphonse Island, AF-Ø33. He'll operate on 20, 17, 15, 12 and 10M SSB. QSL via HB9CQK, Frederic Furrer, Winkelhalde 11, CH-6048, Horw, Switzerland - or via the bureau.

Shigeo Matsui, JA1JQY, will be on Palau April 29-May 2. The main purpose of the trip is scuba diving, but he will have a 100-watt rig and a simple antenna along with him for some operating time on 40-15M. Shigeru has been

on the air from a lot of nice places previously: 3D2SH, 8Q7QY, 9M6JQT, T22JY, T88JY, XV5JY, VK9XY, H44, KHØ, and KH8/JA1JQY.

Johan, ON4IQ, is planning three expeditions for 2005. First, he will join Dick, K5AND; Arliss; W7XU and YL Holly starting at the end of June for two weeks in Grenada. In late September, Johan will join ON4QX in an operation from Saint Martin in the Caribbean. The third weekend in September he will go with ON4QX to Sint Maarten, the Dutch side of the island.

Bob Peterson, W3YYwill be in Bangalore, India April 29-May 5 on a work project. Miku, VU2WAP has invited Bob to operate his station, which he plans to do Especially look for him the weekend of April 29-31. (I can personally attest that Miku's station is workable with 100 watts – W9UF)

Members of the Scottish-Russian ARS and West of Scotland ARS will commemorate the 60th anniversary of the ending of World War II by activating special event station GB6WW from May 1-28. QSL via MMØD-FV.

Janne, OH5NKD (OH3DD) has been working in Angola for several months now and is on the air as D2DX. He is expected to be there until sometime in 2007. His plans are to be active on all bands and modes. Janne reports that he is currently starting construction of antennas for the low bands. Recent radio trouble that took him off the air has been resolvedly with a brand new Icom.

Six meter operators take note: W7AV, K6JEN, and KB7TX, plan to be QRV from Utila Island, Honduras (EK66) from June 18 to 30. They will have a 6 meter CW beacon directed towards the U.S. on 50.110 MHz, which will be breakable. The beacon call will be HR9/W7AV. They will also be operating on 15 through 40 meters on SSB, CW and PSK, however most of the activity will be on 6 meters when and if there is an opening. QSL to home call with SASE.

Victor "Vic" Karassev, RD1AL, who was QRV last year from the North Pole 32 drifting station (NP-32) as RØPA is currently active as RD1AL/Ø from the new North Pole 33 drifting station located at position 89N 152E. The station was officially opened on April 11, 2005. His favorite frequency on CW is 14010 kHz. QSL via his homecall either via the bureau or via direct to RD1AL, Victor Karassev, P.O. Box 73, St. Petersburg, 191126 RUSSIA.

CQ magazine has announced the revival of the long-dormant CQ DX Marathon, last run in 1948. The new CQ DX Marathon will essentially be a year-long DX contest, with stations competing to contact as many different countries ("entities") and CQ Zones of the World as possible over a full-year period, then starting again at

zero at the beginning of the next year. This is part of CQ Magazine's broader "Waking Up DXing" program, whose goal is to reinvigorate DXing, or contacting hams in faraway places. The program was outlined for the first time at the International DX Convention in Visalia, California on April 16.

"DXing has always been the heart of ham radio," says CQ Editor Rich Moseson, W2VU, "and it continues to be the biggest thing that sets us apart from other forms of electronic communication. Healthy DXing activity is vital to the long-term health of amateur radio." Bob Locher, W9KNI, of Idiom Press, provided the inspiration for the new activity and joined in the announcement at Visalia. "Many active DXers have noticed a drop-off in general DXing activity outside of contests and DXpeditions," notes Locher. "I suggested that CQ start up an event that would promote activity all year long, would minimize geographic advantages and provide for simple scoring. It turns out that the CQ DX Marathon, which evolved after 1948 into the CQ World Wide DX Contest, was already based on the same concepts."

Scoring will be very simple, consisting of the total number of DX entities and CQ zones contacted over the course of a year. There will be no multipliers and each country and zone will count only once. In the case of a tie, the station whose last qualifying contact came earliest in the year will be the winner. Complete details and rules for the new CQ DX Marathon will be published in the May issue of CQ magazine and will be posted on the CQ website (www.cq-amateur-radio.com) after the issue is in subscribers' hands. The first running of the event will be in 2006.

SPECIAL HF NEWS

The Department of State has authorized a Third Party Agreement change. Effective March 28, 2005, US radio amateurs may conduct third party communications with radio amateurs in the UK. The previous limitation with "GB" stations only has been removed. This information was received one day after publication of April's Hamletter. The FCC will shortly be updating their web page to reflect the following:

Third Party Communications Section 97.115 of the Commission's Rules, 47 C.F.R. §97.115, authorizes an amateur station regulated by the FCC to transmit a message from its control operator (first party) to another amateur station control operator (second party) on behalf of another person (third party). No amateur station, however, shall transmit messages for a third party to any station within the jurisdiction of any foreign government whose administration has not made arrangements with the United States to allow amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties.

The following countries have made the necessary arrangements with the United States to permit an amateur station regulated by the FCC to exchange messages for a third party with amateur stations in: Antigua and Barbuda, Argentina, Australia, Belize, Bolivia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Federal Islamic Republic of Comoros, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, The Gambia, Ghana, Grenada, Guatemala, Guyana, Haiti, Honduras, Israel, Jamaica, Jordan, Liberia, Republic of the Marshall Islands, Mexico, Federated States of Micronesia, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, St. Christopher and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Swaziland, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, United Kingdom, Uruguay, and Venezuela. The United Nations also has arrangements with the United States to permit an amateur station regulated by the FCC to exchange messages for a third party with amateur stations 4U1ITU in Geneva, Switzerland, and 4U1VIC in Vienna, Austria.

No amateur station regulated by the FCC shall transmit messages for a third party to any amateur station located within the jurisdiction of any foreign government not listed above. This prohibition does not apply to a

message for any third party who is eligible to be the control operator of the station.

EU-032. (Special Event) To commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Liberation of the Oleron Island, Jean-Paul, F5BZK (ex-XE1BZK), will be active as TM6IO from April 25th to May 8th. QSL via his home call-sign.

EU-067. Before Tomas, LY1DF, makes his trip to the Dodecanese Islands (EU-001), he will activate the Cyclades Islands for one day, April 27th, as SV8/LY1DF. Activity will be 30 meters and up. QSL via LY1DF, by the bureau or direct.

EU-129. Operators DK8MIL, DK7JAN, DO9BS, DG9BTX and DJ9MD will be active April 22-26th as DF0TM from Usedom Island (GIA O-13). Activity will be on 14260 kHz and other HF bands. They will also be on local repeaters and try to operate on 2m SSB. QSL via DF0TM (QRZ.com).

EU-137. Look for Jan/SM7NGH and Fred/SM7DAY to be active as homecall/P from Ven Island (Lighthouse WLH 0780), April 18-20th. QSL via the bureau or their CBA.
