QST –OCT. –The Shack in "Mr. Popper's Penguins" –How it Got Together on Screen

When you see Ham Gear in a movie scene, you wonder why they didn't get it right. In this blockbuster movie from last summer's screen they did a good job. The story behind it is on page 75 of this month's QST. In this case, the Assistant Prop Manager for the set was the son of a Ham, Jack Schankar, W2STM, of Rochester, N. Y. The movie was set in 1970, and so all the equipment was shipped off to the movie studio, right out of the shack. Jack had to be on the set, too. His biggest problem was making the meter needles work when there was no one really transmitting. His regular job is that of a professor of Engineering Technology at the Rochester Institute of Technology and his QSL card plus a mug shot of Jim Carrey with penguins is reproduced with the article by S. Khrystyne Keane, K1SFA, of the ARRL News Staff.

FRENCH AND SWISS TEAM BREAKS DISTANCE RECORD ON 10 GHz.

The "microwave ham community" is a select group of amateurs that are motivated to try and surpass the exiting records. In June of 2000 it was set by a contact between Israel and Italy—2079 Kilometers. Notice it was all over water. The "evaporation duct" over water averages 13 inches in height, and enough to keep the signal going for long distances. The story on page 68 tells how they picked sites off the East African coast to straight line it to mainland Portugal to create the new record. Pierre-Andre Probst, HB9AZN, one of the participants, tells the story.

DXPEDITION TO THE TIP OF SOUTH AMERICA – JUST FOR A COUPLE OF ISLANDS

Yes, Cezar Trifu, VE3LYC, and his partner, Johan, PA3EXX, did just that despite the ship killing winds that circulate around the infamous "Cape Horn". Cezar gives us four pages of narrative and photos of this classic adventure that added the No. 1 most wanted island in South America and the No. 6 in the world wide list to the IOTA (Islands on the Air). You probably have not heard of them: Herschel and Gonzalo Island. Not only did they withstand the winds, but a pair of Caracara birds (a type of Austral falcons) would peck away at their radial masts, causing them to fall and break. They operated on 17, 20 and 30 meters with a total of 3058 QSOs with 2378 stations. What a personal accomplishment for those two hams! See pages 64 through 67.
