and how it would change things, but I hope we all now feel more comfortable with it. If you are interested in learning more about ICS and NIMS for future field day activates or for EmComm/AuxComm activities, I encourage you to take IS100B and IS700 at <u>http://training.fema.gov/IS/NIMS.aspx.</u> They are free online courses offered through FEMA.

Now, I know that Field Day is a contest as well. Due to the deadline for copy, we do not yet have the absolute final numbers available yet but we do have a close guess. We made 749 contacts (of which almost half were two point contacts). Preliminary QSO counts: CW-177, Digital-186, Phone-361, GOTA-36. Bonus points around 1410. Estimated total score is 3612-3652 as 4A. Last year as 5A our score was 2224 so this year was ~ 64% better than last year. We had 14 visitors signed in on the visitors log and 8 GOTA operators.

One final thanks to our "Grill Master" KB9RTO for a fantastic job doing the steaks for dinner. KB9RTO grilled up 23 steaks for our members and friends. I think at one time or another we had 30 club members or their friends on the site.

TERRORISTS' ATTACK MAKES 2013 BOSTON MARATHON NOTABLE

When Boston area Hams signed up to work on the Boston Marathon this year they had no ideas they would be at the thick of things at the Finish Line when the bombing occurred. More than 200 volunteers were in for a surprise and they performed with style. The story of their performance is featured on pages 65-67.

There is another feature on pages 77-79 with personal interviews with two hams that were closely involved with the action; one was a "starting line worker, the other was shadowing one of the race's officials. You'll enjoy their stories.

2ND RELAY MADE DRAMATIC WITH HAMS PUTTING LONG RANGE VIDEO ON AIR

What's a big race when nobody is there to watch the finish? Nothing. The Big Bend 50 Ultra Marathon is a world famous endurance race conducted near San Antonio, Texas, at Big Bend National Park. The problem is that the Finish Line is at an amphitheater which is "off-limits" due to environmental impact to the wilderness location in the Chihuahuan Desert. Spectators have to await the outcome of the race at a village about 10 miles away. A group of hams from Austin got the idea to deploy a high speed multi-media mesh network to broadcast the finish! 
What: A potluck club picnic - Please bring a side dish or desert to pass. The club will provide soda, water and hot beef or BBQ chicken sandwiches

Are you interested in helping scouts get more involved with ham radio? One way is to help them earn their Radio Merit Badge. Area scouts have several opportunities to attend merit badge classes as part of organized events on weekends. Ones I've seen recently don't offer the radio merit badge because no has offered to lead it. The topics to be covered are easy (for licensed hams) to understand and can be a lead-in to getting them through an entire tech class. Here's a sample of topics to cover:

1. Explain what radio is.

2. Explain the difference between a DX and a local station. Discuss what the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) does and how it is different from the International Telecommunication Union.

3. Explain how radio waves carry information. Include in your explanation: transceiver, transmitter, receiver, amplifier, and antenna.

4. Find out about three career opportunities in radio. Pick one and find out the education, training, and experience required for this profession. Discuss this with your counselor, and explain why this profession might interest you.

5. <u>AMATEUR RADIO:</u>

* Tell why the FCC has an amateur radio service. Describe some of the activities that amateur radio operators can do on the air, once they have earned an amateur radio license.

* Using proper call signs, Q signals, and abbreviations, carry on a 10 minute real or simulated radio contact using voice, Morse Code, or digital mode. (Licensed amateur radio operators may substitute five QSL cards as evidence of contacts with amateur radio operators from at least three different call districts.) Properly log the real or simulated ham radio contact and record the signal report.

* Explain at least five Q signals or amateur radio terms you hear while listening.

* Explain some of the differences between the Technician, General, and Extra Class license requirements and privileges. Explain who administers amateur radio exams.

* Explain how you would make an emergency call on voice or Morse code.
* Explain the differences between handheld transceivers and home "base"

transceivers. Explain the uses of mobile amateur radio transceivers and amateur radio repeaters.

In addition, as we look to the fall, JOTA may give us an opportunity to help teach the radio merit badge while having fun getting youth on the air. To be a radio merit badge counselor, you need to fill out an "Adult Application" which includes a background check and personal references. The process is simple and I can help you through it. Let me know if you are interested in joining me? I would like to have at least 2 additional volunteers.
